

# Seminars and Lectures

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The Institute organizes lectures on current issues and topics of special interest. The lectures are open to the public, although some are held for limited audiences consisting of Diet members, government officials, members of private sector organizations (research organizations, the press, and universities), etc. About thirty lectures are held every year, among which ten are organized in various regions of Japan with the collaboration of local economic and research organizations.

In addition, Summer Seminars are held every year to disseminate information about development issues. In FY2002, ten courses (thirty subjects) were organized. The themes in FY2002 included "Globalization and Asia: A New Exploration of Intra-Asian Economic Relationships," "Searching for Clues for the Revival of Africa," and "Economic Development and Governance."

Seminars on specific subjects were held for those who are particularly interested in issues of development and/or developing areas. One of them dealt with "Prolonged Use of IMF Resources."

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## Commendation for Outstanding Publications

(Award for the Promotion of Studies on Developing Countries)

In order to promote studies on developing countries, and to encourage researchers in Japan who are engaged in such studies, the Institute grants awards each year for outstanding publications on economic and other issues concerning developing countries. In 2002, a total of fifty-nine books and papers published during the previous year were recommended for consideration by distinguished scholars in related fields. The selection committee, consisting of the members listed below, examined four reports and eventually selected one publication listed below. The award was presented to the author by the Institute on July 3, 2002.

# Office Information Systematization

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In fiscal year 2002, the Research Information Systems Division of the Institute worked extensively to improve the function of the information systems used by the Institute, particularly the upgrading of the Field Survey Management System. The system was developed based on proposals such as the action plan for the Formation of an Advanced Information and Telecommunications Network Society as mandated by the government. The Division also worked for the more stable management and operation of its information systems.

(1) Improvement of Information System Functions. For the Field Survey Management System, a system for calculating of traveling expenses and for printing of field survey lists, was developed. The OS was changed from a UNIX-based to a Windows-based server which will make it possible to cut the costs of developing systems.

(2) Management and Operation of Information Systems. The Institute gives high priority to the stable management and operation of information systems. In order to prevent illegal access to the Institute's information systems and damage from computer viruses, firewall log supervision was implemented, and virus checks were performed on both servers and clients. Security packs were installed on all servers and clients to prevent security problems related to the OS or software.

(3) Preparation of Basic Concepts for the Next Information System. A contract was concluded with a consulting firm to prepare basic concepts for the next information system to be installed at the Institute and to conduct a survey on trends in the latest technology for servers and clients. This was intended to prepare basic specifications for various servers, clients, and peripheral equipment to be used by the Institute, and to examine the current trends in technology. Draft specifications and scheduling were announced publicly in accordance with international bidding procedures.

(4) Installation of Terminals for Information Access. In compliance with the Law Concerning Access to Information Held by Administrative Organs (Disclosure of Administrative Documents) enacted in October 2002, LAN wiring and terminal setups were put in as part of the installation of PC terminals which will be used to access lists of documents available for public viewing on the Institute's Internet website.
